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"It is only because of the LORD'S great mercy that we are not consumed, because his compassion fail not. They are new every morning: Great is thy faithfulness."

Lamentations 3:22-23

God's mercy upon us has no limit - it is endless - Endures forever - it has infinity!

Psalms 136 is a beautiful chapter in the Bible demonstrating God's great mercy for our people. We understand that our people, what we would call the White race, is Israel. We understand that our people, the lost tribes of Israel, after suffering seven invasions by Assyria and Babylon, were carried out of their homeland traveling through the Dariel Pass of the Caucasus Mountains into Europe.

Although a small number from Judah, after 70 years of captivity did return, the vast majority did not. When we as individuals or as a people suffer - God's mercy is everlasting. There is no end. No limits.

In Psalm 136, we are reminded over and over again of the great mercy God has for our people. For 26 verses, we hear the repetition that the mercy of God endures forever! You need to take time to read Psalms 36 to begin understanding the mercy of God. Consider that, for the most part; it is a mercy upon a people that doesn't deserve it. We have a powerful God. Let's look at some wonderful highlights of this chapter in the Bible.

The call to thanksgiving

Psalms 136: 1-3

1. O give thanks unto the LORD; for he is good: for his mercy endureth forever.

The psalmist looks at God's goodness manifested in His "mercy." The word for mercy is the word for grace or loving-kindness. This "mercy endures forever" - for infinity! The Psalm begins with the call to thanksgiving— O give thanks unto the LORD. The opening verses provide a three-fold invitation for thanks to God for His goodness and mercy.

"Mercy," which may also be translated as "loyal

love," is the most significant term used in the Psalms to describe the character of God. His mercy is "forever" and part of His eternal character to save His people - His kinsmen.

The counsels of this mercy have been everlasting, and the effects of it will endure forever to all our people. The Lord continues equally ready to show mercy for all who seek after it, and this is the source of all our hope and comfort—knowing that when we see this hatred towards our people, we have a loving God that will not forget His promise.

2. O give thanks unto the God of gods: for his mercy endureth forever.

God is merciful because it is His nature to be merciful. When Moses, in his memories, sought to explain to Israel why God set His heart's affections on them. He said, "because the LORD loved you, and because he would keep the oath which he had sworn unto your fathers, hath the LORD brought you out with a mighty hand, and redeemed you out of the house of bondmen, from the hand of Pharaoh king of Egypt."

We are His children, His offspring. He is our father!

Moreover, He is God of gods above all these other "gods" or earthly rulers. The gods of the heathen are idols.

3. O give thanks to the Lord of lords: for his mercy endureth forever.

He is not only God of Israel; He is also Lord. He is all sovereign. All power in heaven and earth is His. The "mystery of iniquity" works its woes in the world. Empires may rise and fall. However, God, in His mercy, sets boundaries to it all. Evil men like those that seek to destroy our racial bloodline through miscegenation, either they are Jews in your film industry, or those that promote race mixing, immoral lifestyles of homosexuality, transgenderism, or they be a local pastor that accepts and tolerates race-mixing, we all should give thanks that these evil-doers have their limits. Those who attempt to subvert God's power and righteous order are overthrown in time. God wins.

The God of Creation

Psalms 136:4-9

4. To him who alone doeth great wonders: for his mercy endureth forever.

We have a God who "doeth wonders." The universe is full of such wonders. From the inner mystery of the cells to the outer mystery of black holes in space, all creation bears tribute to the wonder of this God, whose "mercy endureth forever. Thus, is celebrated as an extraordinary creation achievement illustrating both the power and intelligence of God. For example lightning bugs, there are nearly two thousand species of lightning bugs living on every continent except Antarctica. They thrive in humid, tropical areas. The males usually are what we see at night; the females usually hide near water and tall grass. But the males and females communicate with their lighting.

There exist over 12,000 different species of ants. There is the bullet ant in the Amazon. The sting is the same feeling as being hit by a bullet. Ants are the strongest in their size. They can carry about 50 times of their weight. And some can live up to 30 years.

5. To him, that by wisdom made the heavens: for his mercy endureth forever. 6. To him that stretched out the Earth above the waters: for his mercy endureth forever.

He put the stars in space. He is the One who created the heavens with his wisdom and intelligence. He made the firmament and atmosphere in the air so we can breathe and survive. The atmosphere of Earth is unique in that this bubble around the Earth extends 430 miles into space and protects us from meteorites, and warms Earth's atmosphere.

7. To him that made great lights: for his mercy endureth forever: 8. The sun to rule by day: for his mercy endureth forever: 9. The moon and stars to rule by night: for his mercy endureth forever.

He gave the sun and moon their form. How great they are. One is a giant reactor generating heat and light with efficiency beyond anything ever dreamed of by the ancients; the other is a great reflector to catch the light of the absent sun and throws its beams on the darkened Earth.

God has ensured that the sun will shine as long as life is on Earth. He also gave the sun and moon their function: "The sun to rule by day: for His mercy endureth forever: The moon and stars to rule by night: for his mercy endureth forever." Think of the orderliness of the sun, the moon, and the stars - the way they obey the laws of God as they undertake their journeys through space. The hard-and-fast rule of the sun, moon, and stars is another proof that God's mercy "endureth forever."

The God of History

Psalms 136:10

10. To him that smote Egypt in their firstborn: for his mercy endureth forever:

Mercy? To smite the firstborn? Mercy? Yes. It could have been everyone. Nor did that terrible day come until he had shown Pharaoh and Egypt both His pity and His power nine times. Not until he had been lied to and played with and resisted by the Pharaoh and his court nine times did God smite. Mercy? Yes. God remembers His mercy through his judgment.

11. And brought out Israel from among them: for his mercy endureth forever: 12. With a strong hand, and with a stretched out arm: for his mercy endureth forever.

It was the strong hand of which Jesus spoke when He drew attention to salvation much greater than that of the Hebrews from Egypt. "My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me, and I give eternal life to them, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of My hand." This was a call to our people that our people have always heard the voice of their kinsman redeemer, Jesus Christ. Our racial people are known as a Christian people because we are racially connected to Jesus

Christ.

"My Father, who has given them to Me, is greater than all; and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand" John 10:27-29. That, too, was the arm that is not shortened that it cannot save. The arm we see outstretched on the cross. Jesus died for His people. He was sent to only one people, Matt 1:21. In modern times, we would say the white and our racial kindred people. Apostle Paul in Romans specifically said in 9:4, "Who are Israelites; to whom pertaineth the adoption, and the glory, and the covenants, and the giving of the law, and the service of God, and the promises; Whose are the fathers, and of whom are concerning the flesh Christ came, who is over all, God blessed for ever. Amen."

13. To him which divided the Red sea into parts: for his mercy endureth forever: 14. And made Israel to pass through the midst of it: for his mercy endureth forever: 15. But overthrew Pharaoh and his host in the Red Sea: for his mercy endureth forever. When Pharaoh's heart was hardened for the last time and pursued Israel, God's mighty arm was outstretched to bar his way. The pillar of fire came around and stood between Israel and Egypt's calvary. Then followed the greatest miracle of the Exodus; the waters of the Red Sea parted so that this saved people might safely pass over on dry land to the other side.

Pharaoh believed God was not all-powerful and would not protect His people. So, he proceeded forward against Israel. Halfway across, his chariots broke down. Then back came the sea. God did not put all these marvelous actions in place for Pharoah to destroy Israel. All history bears witness to that. When we see the troubles in the world today with our people, we should realize that these tyrants will not last long. God will destroy them. 16. To him which led his people through the wilderness: for his mercy endureth forever.

God's daily guidance of Israel was as great a demonstration of His mercy as was His salvation by Moses (who was trained as a commander in the Egyptian military to move thousands and thousands of people, the logistics, alone, is sometimes unnoticed). He fed them with bread from heaven, gave them water from the "the rock," gave them victory over Amalek, and led them to an Oasis of rest along the way. Above all, he had to endure their constant complaints and back talking. And even though they failed, God still had mercy upon His children.

21. And gave their land for a heritage: for his mercy endureth forever: 22. Even a heritage unto Israel his servant: for his mercy endureth forever.

Where ever our European white ancestors planted their feet, they conquered and subdued the land. God blessed our people, fulfilling the prophecy that God gave Joshua, that wherever they go, God would bless them. Now, our people are being punished because we no longer love our people, and as a result, our people are being replaced and destroyed through race-mixing, immoral sexual acts like homosexuality, transgenderism, abortion, and racial population replacement. However, even with these atrocities upon our people, God's mercy will endure forever.

23. Who remembered us in our low estate: for his mercy endureth forever:

Our merciful God remembers us. How horrible it would be if our God couldn't remember His promises. But he always remembers no matter how low our estate, how far we have fallen, how frail and forgetful we are.

24. And hath redeemed us from our enemies: for his mercy endureth forever.

The word redeemed means "rescued." God knows how to rescue His people. When we see what surrounds us today, the time of Jacob's trouble, we know that God will rescue us and redeem the remnant, those who have remained faithful to Him and his laws. That should give us hope, not depression. That should provide us with excitement in that evangelistic spirit, knowing that our message to our people will be victorious.

25. Who giveth food to all flesh: for his mercy endureth forever.

He cares for His creation regardless. Every creature has its place in God's balance of nature. He provides for them all. He has a plan for his creation and a purpose for them all.

He reveals His mercy in His care for you, helping you to fight battles not only on a personal level but defeating our enemies on a national level. Israel has not always been faithful to God; however, He is faithful to us as a merciful God.

The Doxology of Thanksgiving

Psalms 136:10-25

26. O give thanks unto the God of heaven: for his mercy endureth forever.

The God of heaven is caring for you on Earth. His mercy endures forever.

This Psalm ends with a celebration of God's continuing faithfulness to His people Israel - our people, and a call to thank Him for His continuing goodness. **END**
